- 1. **Paper Earrings** Construct a pair of earrings made from paper. Maximum size 3" X 3" X 3" including findings (holder)
- 1. **Hex Ornament** Design and color a Hex sign as an ornament. Maximum size 6" X 6" X 1/2" does NOT include hanger/string.
- **STEM:** Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics

- 3. **Painted Gourd** Paint a spring themed gourd. Maximum size 8" X 8" X 8"
- 4. **Decorated Bottle** Decorate the outside of a bottle with any medium. No inside decorations. Maximum size 8" x 8" X 8"
- 5. Cross Stitch Pillow Create a Cross Stitch Pillow. Maximum size 8" X 8" X 8"

015-820 Human Trafficking, a modern form of slavery according to UNICEF, is the world's fastest global crime and second largest source of illegal income.

Nearly one-third of trafficking victims, globally, are children, and the numbers will raise with the number of unaccompanied children that have been crossing the southern border of the U.S. What will happen to these vulnerable children? The government should provide a safe place for the children, they need to strengthen the child protection systems to prevent trafficking, violence, abuse, and the exploitation against children.

If you listen to the news, you will hear that children are being placed in over-crowded conditions. The government needs to step up and take responsibility for all these unaccompanied children who may become victims of child trafficking/abuse. You can be an advocate by sending a letter to your local elected official to let them know that trafficking of children is an issue that needs their attention and matters to you. Sign your letter in **RED** and indicate that you are a member of GFWC Pennsylvania Women's Club.

Congratulations Pennsylvania clubs for keeping communications open during the challenging year 2020!

Eighteen clubs reported with narratives and 11 more with statistics only. There were 116 projects, 2,762 hours, \$2,875 donated and \$3,459.45 in-kind donations for Communications/Public Relations/Social Media. Rotting food in landfills emits methane, a powerful greenhouse gas. In 2019, methane accounted for about 10 percent of all U.S. greenhouse gas emissions from human activities.

Virtually Volunteering

A few decades ago, there were very few computers being used in schools and businesses. Those computers were big and clumsy and they didn't do many things. Now, young people carry their iPads, smart phones, and laptops in their pockets. Teachers and textbooks are right there at their fingertips. Information is instantly available. Technology has raced ahead in ways no one imagined. Many schools now supply chrome books to all of their students.

The question now is how to best use those computers and tablets. "Virtual" schooling has become the new buzzword.

Vision Impairment Awareness is more than meets the eye.

Did you know that the eyes are the window to other health issues? Droopy eyelids, which can be caused by stress and fatigue, can also signify a stroke, diabetes, and other health problems.

During my daughter Brianna's first year of college, she sent photos of herself which looked like she was winking because her right eye was slightly closed. With further observation, we realized that her eyelid was drooping.

The doctor examined her eye and diagnosed it as a lazy eye. He wasn't concerned. Over the next four years, the eyelid became puffy with a severe droop. Two doctors and several examinations later, she received the same feedback but was only prescribed topical ointment. Shockingly, she was told that she was aging early. A year later, Brianna had a crying episode and her eye swelled shut. She was referred to a specialist who immediately informed her that it was serious. It was either an autoimmune disease or cancer.


Brianna had a surgical biopsy and was diagnosed with Non-Hodgkin's Lymphoma of the Lacrimal Gland which is typically found in someone 65 or older. The cancer was localized to her eye and treated with radiation. Three months ago, she was informed that she is cancer free. Brianna's story was a success because her cancer was slow growing. Otherwise, with the misdiagnosis, it would not have been.

Brianna's advice is to always trust yourself and your body's signals as they maybe calling for help.

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RULES of COURTESY to the BLIND

- 1. When offering assistance to a blind person do so directly; this helps her to locate you. Ask," May I help you?" speaking in a normal tone.
- 2. In guiding a blind person, permit her to take your arm. Say, "Here is my left arm." She knows how to take your arm and will respond to your motion. Never grab a blind person's arm she cannot anticipate your movement if you do.
- 3. In walking with a blind person, proceed at normal pace; hesitate slightly before stepping up or down. After crossing street, see that she is started straight in the direction she wants to take and caution her of any obstruction ahead.
- 4. In showing a blind person to a chair, place her hand upon the back of it. Do not try to push her into it. Her touch will tell her the type, width, and height of the chair.
- 5. When eating with a blind person offer to read the menu including the price of each item. When the food arrives, tell her where each item is on the plate top left, middle right, etc. If serving food, as you place each item on the table, call her attention to it as, "Here is your water." Offer to serve food from a casserole or platter, or cut up the food. It is never bad form to offer.
- 6. When conversing with a blind person, use normal terms as well as normal tone. Speak directly to her.
- 7. If making change in bills of more than one denomination hand her the bills separately and identify each denomination as you hand it to her. This is not necessary for coins, she knows them by touch.
- 8. If you see a blind person with a guide dog, do not approach the dog while it is working. The dog is at full attention to the needs of its owner. If the dog is at rest, ask the person if you may approach the dog.
- 9. When giving directions, don't point. Say, "Three blocks ahead, the building is on your right."
- 10. Remember she can't read street signs, note colors of buildings, etc.
- 11. Above all don't pity her. Thousands are successful workers and many more are working toward independence through local agencies of the PA Association for the Blind.

Your gifts to the local agencies help support the training and hiring of blind labor.

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
