

Our clubs' projects in promoting advocacy through programs and volunteering have certainly been affected by the pandemic. However, as individuals we can still advocate for children within our neighborhoods and families.

In the U.S., the number of children and adolescents affected by obesity has more than tripled since the 1970's. The current pandemic contributes even further to the problem due to closure of schools, lack of mandated activity programs within the schools, and closure of after school activities. Obesity is a risk factor for increased severity of Covid-19, as excess weight decreases an individual's immune response. The chance for obesity can be reduced by offering more fruits and vegetables, creating a schedule for meals and snacks, keeping healthy food in the home and reducing screen time after the hours of virtual learning for school.

Also, as parents and grandparents we can model healthy eating and exercising habits. Include a child in meal and snack planning and preparation. Invite a child for a walk in a local park or nearby rails to trails to provide exercise and stress relief. Perhaps the child can walk their dog or yours! Plan an interesting diversional activity that does not include food. Play music and have a dance party! You will be benefiting your child—and yourself!

Please remember that April is Child Abuse Awareness Month. Pinwheel information can be obtained at preventchildabuse.org. Also, hopefully, your club is involved in the GFWC 2021 Blanket Challenge. The 2021 Eastern Region Youth Leadership Seminar will be held virtually this spring on June 11-12. This virtual seminar format is like the 2020 seminar from last year. Our Eastern region student attendee from 2020 reported that the seminar was very meaningful and provided good information on leadership practices and good information on future endeavors.

The goal of HOBY is to have high school sophomores explore their leadership skills through these timely programs. All virtual seminars are interactive and follow the HOBY leadership development curriculum allowing these ambassadors to discover leadership from various perspectives. After each seminar, HOBY alumni are challenged to complete 100 hours of service to use these new skills in giving back to their community.

With the virtual format, the registration fee is a flat \$225. Each club is asked to sponsor at least one student, if possible. Schools may register additional students and pay the \$225 fee. 

Domestic Violence and depression during this pandemic are triggering a surge in domestic violence cases in extraordinary proportions!

Due to the quarantine, many are separated from family and friends; another factor is the lack of jobs, money for food and shelter. Food banks across the country are overwhelmed by people needing assistance.

The HR 1585 Violence Against Women Reauthorization Act 2019, has been stalled in Congress, awaiting passage. Passed by the House in April 2019, it sits in the Senate awaiting a vote. Hopefully, it will pass when the new congress reconvenes. Once it is passed in the Senate, it will go back to the House for passage then on to the President's desk to be signed.

FY2021 Act, the Victims of Crime, would grant federal funding for survivors of domestic violence, child abuse, sexual assault, trafficking and other crimes to provide needed community- based programs.

Hopefully, the vaccine for COVID-19 will lessen the burden for many and things will get back to normal in this country.

Now that the holidays are over, but the Covid 19 Pandemic is not, what can we do to make ourselves feel better mentally and physically? Taking a walk is a great idea, but not when it is too cold outside.

To get motivated, try using your phone. There is a free, easy APP called the Gratitude Happiness Journal where you write one or more sentences reflecting on the good things that happened in your day. Do this at the end of each day. Then put your phone away, turn off your TV and unwind with a good book or relaxing music before bedtime. Be sure to get 7 to 9 hours good night's sleep.

Another idea is to make yourself smile at someone each day. Say something nice to someone. You will be surprised at how it makes you feel good about yourself.

Getting into a daily routine, be it for work, or at home, has a positive impact on you. Start slowly to set a simple goal and build on at as you progress.

Remember to keep wearing your mask (over your nose and mouth) whenever you go outside, six-feet social distance, and wash your hands with soap and water for 20 seconds, often.

Ah, trees! The U.S. Forest Service reports the following benefits of healthy trees:

- 100 mature trees catch about 139,000 gallons of rainwater per year
- 100 trees remove 53 tons of carbon dioxide and 430 lbs. of other air pollutants per year
- strategically placed trees save up to 56% of annual air conditioning costs

However, deforestation has been increasing in recent years. Will trees always be there to protect us from storm runoff, soil erosion or the effects of global warming?



In Dauphin and Cumberland Counties, we have partnered with Vision Resources of Central PA (VROCP), an organization that works to provide opportunities to help individuals who are blind or visually impaired to flourish within and enrich our communities. Here is an overview of the services they offer.

- 1. **Case Management** in-home support, transportation to appointments, life skills education meetings, referral services, and enrichment activities
- 2. Access Technology Training use of computers and assistive technology equipment that will enhance employment skills and independence
- Low Vision Care exams and evaluations by optometrists, specialists, and opticians; adaptive training and in-home therapy; low vision equipment and convenience items (such as, large print Bingo cards, low vision pens, large print address books, talking watches and/or glucose meters)
- 4. Reading Services news, information and entertainment provided via radio, live streaming, website, and podcasts
- 5. **Eye Clinic** no-cost exams and glasses to adults and children who qualify
- 6. Prevention of Blindness vision screenings, eye health and safety programs for children

VROCP also provides a free speakers bureau to increase community awareness of the services offered, and hosts a summer day camp for children (grades 4-12) to expose visually impaired children to developmental and sensory activities in safe and supportive environments.

As a means of earning money to pay for all the services they offer, VROCP has a line of business services: clay tile manufacturing, flooring center, mail services, laser printing, and building custodial care. Our state Clubwoman newsletter is printed at VROCP.

A visit to VROCP is being planned so members can see this amazing facility. In the meantime, clubs and individuals are encouraged to contact VROCP (717-238-2531) to determine how they can volunteer. More information is available at their website, VROCP.org, or follow them on Facebook.

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
