It was wonderful to get together with my Federation sisters to celebrate Living the Volunteer Spirit in Pennsylvania.

The 2020-2022 Jennie Award nominee for Pennsylvania is Marcia L. Wilson who will be honored at the Middle Atlantic Region Conference on October 1st and hopefully be chosen as the GFWC award winner.

Looking ahead to the 2021-2022 club year the President's Project, Vision Impairment Awareness, has two projects for clubs; Cash for Clients and a Braille Project created by Northeastern Chairman Ginny Zdanowicz. The Fill a Glass with Hope project is continuing with a club competition. Members will make Smile Bags and Smile Splints for Operation Smile. The Education & Libraries chairman is encouraging clubs to donate STEM books to their schools and libraries. There is a contest to create a STEM bookmark and the winning entry will be mass produced for distribution at the 2022 convention. There is a GFWC ornament contest. October has been recognized as National Bullying Prevention Month. More than one out of every five students will be bullied this year. Every child has the right to feel safe and supported. Bullying is an issue that cannot be considered as a harmless rite of passage. Bullying impacts a child's desire to be in school and the ability to learn. Bullied children often have difficulty concentrating and suffer low self-esteem, self-confidence, and self-worth. Physical symptoms such as headaches, stomachaches, and mental health issues are often present in bullied children.

How can your club help? Sponsor a poster project for children through your local library or child advocacy group to demonstrate inclusion ideas. Inclusion is inviting and involving others so that everyone feels welcomed, valued, and supported. Ideas for the poster could include introducing yourself to others; inviting others to play; telling someone why they are inspiring; involving others in your conversation; showing interest in learning about experiences which are different from your own.

In 1959 a typhoon struck Japan. Two young women visiting Japan decided to take a walk after the storm and discover 11 children huddled together cold and hungry with no one to care for them. Since they choose not to ignore these children, they searched for help, but because the children were ½ American and ½ Japanese no orphanage would take them. They finally found a woman who would care for the children plus 100 more orphans. Upon returning to the U.S., they decided to start *International Orphans*.

Fast forward to 2021, many organizations began because of these two women who choose not to ignore the "throwaway children" as they were called. *Childhelp.org. National Child Abuse Hotline, Foster & Adoptive Care Services, Group Homes, Child help Speak Up Be Safe, Residential Treatment Facilities and Advocacy Centers.*

The Stronger Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Act H.R.485 passed in the U.S. House in March 2021. It is awaiting action in the Senate. Contact your Senators today and urge their support.

FYI! The two women are Sara O'Meara and Yvonne Fedderson, the actresses who played Ricky and David Nelson's girlfriends on" The Adventures of Ozzie and Harriet". Their organizations continue to support children today.

Finding Books to Read

For those of you who love to read, recent times have been difficult. Books are more difficult to get our hands on. During the past year, libraries were often closed or were only open for limited hours. Some libraries offered "Pick Up at the Door" service. This only works well when you know exactly what books you want.

Book stores were sometimes open but buying books can quickly become expensive.

If there are second-hand stores nearby, used books can often be found for sale at a reasonable price. Unfortunately, selections are usually rather limited.

Some of us have family and friends who read as much as we do and have similar reading interests. It is sometimes possible to borrow books from them if they have similar tastes.

When clubs were conducting in-person meetings, book exchanges became very popular. Club members had what they called *suitcase sharing* kind of a "Have Book, Will travel" idea. Their education chairman found a used suitcase and put some books inside. She brought it to the meetings and encouraged members to put a book inside and take a different book out.

Another possibility is a Little Free Library Book Sharing Box. "There are over 100,000 worldwide. Little Free Library is a nonprofit organization that inspires a love of reading, builds community, and sparks creativity by fostering neighborhood book exchanges around the world. Through Little Free Library book exchanges, millions of books are exchanged each year, profoundly increasing access to books for readers of all ages and backgrounds." Members from the Upper Allen Women's Club GFWC visited the agency and toured the facility. Here is what Karen Stauffer had to say: "One would expect to learn about the technological devices that assist visually impaired people while visiting Vision Resources. We saw this and so much more. All that is accomplished by this organization, which doesn't get the press coverage they are due, is amazing! First of all, they are housed in a formerly owned factory, which has been redesigned to meet their needs. The area is used to package and assemble items, serve as a warehouse for customers, do Braille transcription, do audio recording, and do laser printing for customers. Ink pens are assembled and sold. Volunteers help read the newspaper and books on their radio station. In addition to these services, people are employed to do custodial care, mail services, and commercial and residential flooring. Almost all of these positions are filled by people with physical challenges. Along with coordinating these services and employment opportunities, this amazing organization must raise funding. Arrangements are made for doctors to examine uninsured patients. In addition to all of these activities, the organization runs a summer camp for visually impaired children. What an enlightening experience this visit was.!" There is a need for volunteers. Thank you for your support of the President's Project in 2020. It was enjoyable reading your reports and selecting the winners who received their certificates at the 2021 convention in July. Hopefully, you have started planning for the 2021-2022 club year using the materials in the packet convention attendees and each club president received. Here are the emphasis areas:

Cash for Clients: The purpose of this project is for clubs to make monetary donations to their local agency of the PA Association for the Blind to purchase vision aids. Contact your local agency to identity the needs of their clients, then determine how much money your club will be able to donate. This money may be able to help a specific client or provide items the agency keeps in stock to use as needed. We hope to be able to improve the lives of visually impaired people through the purchase of vision aids.

Eye Exams: Having regular eye exams is very important for your eye health. This project involves clubs recording the number of members who have had eye exams from January1, 2020 - December 31, 2021. This is retroactive to include those people who had an exam in 2020 and would not be due for their next exam until 2022.

Braille Project: Please plan to attend the Fall District Meetings to learn more about this fun and educational activity. We will be learning about the Braille system and making club signs and member name card signs using the Braille Alphabet. This project will begin in the fall and end on December 31, 2021, so it can be reported for the 2021 club year. Then you will need to keep the signs and cards in a safe place and take them to the 2022 convention where the items will be displayed as a culminating activity for the President's Project.

Contact Lens Recycle Project: This project is part of the Environment Community Service Program. Please read that article for more information. If your club participates, the number of contact lenses recycled will be reported on the Vision Impairment Report Form.

Eyeglass Collection Project: The collection and donation of eyeglasses will continue with an emphasis on placing collection boxes in the community with your club name displayed. This will attract attention for your club as well as provide a community service. The glasses will then be donated to a local Lions club or other agency.

Volunteer Project: Hopefully, the volunteer opportunities with your local agency will open up this year. Contact them to see how you can help as the types of activities vary among the agencies.

Remember, your district chairmen for the President's Project are always available to help. Contact them with any questions you may have. As we continue on this journey, remember to keep the FOCUS on Seeing the Vision.
