## **BYLAWS and RESOLUTIONS**

### **Bylaws**:

The Bylaws were all reviewed during the last administration.

The committee has reviewed and approved a bylaw amendment proposal that was submitted.

The following amendment is recommended by the committee for approval at the Convention/Business Meeting May 2023.

### Article X Board of Directors

Section 1. COMPOSITION. The members of the GFWC Pennsylvania Board of Directors shall be:

- a. The Officers of GFWC Pennsylvania
  - The six District Directors

Chairman of Community Service Programs

Chairmen of the following committees: Leadership, Membership, Fundraising, GFWC Signature Program: Domestic Violence Awareness and Prevention, GFWC Junior Program: Child Advocacy, and the GFWC Pennsylvania State President's Project

**Proposed to add to "d.":** Communications/Public Relations/Social Media, Legislation/Public Policy and Women's History and Resource Center (WHRC)/Pennsylvania Historian Chairman.

#### Article X, Section 1. d. would then read as follows:

Chairmen of the following committees: Leadership, Membership, Fundraising, GFWC Signature Program: Domestic Violence Awareness and Prevention, GFWC Junior Program: Child Advocacy, and the GFWC Pennsylvania State President's Project, Communications/Public Relations/Social Media, Legislation/Public Policy and Women's History and Resource Center (WHRC)/Pennsylvania Historian Chairman.

**Rational:** These three chairmen serve in the same capacity as the other chairmen in section d and the chairman of the Community Service Programs and should be entitled to a vote at the board meetings.

Prevent Child Abuse America is the nation's oldest and largest organization committed to preventing child abuse and neglect before it happens. This organization promotes programs and resources that enable kids, families, and entire communities to thrive. They raise public awareness and engagement, and advocate for family friendly policies, at national, state, and local levels, to support programs that ensure children and families get what they need to succeed.

Child abuse includes all types of abuse and neglect of a child under the age of 18 by a parent, caregiver, or another person in a custodial role that results in harm, potential for harm, or threat of harm to a child. Children, and even infants, witnessing or experiencing abuse can exhibit negative behavior years later.

Child abuse and neglect are serious problems that can have lasting harmful effects on survivors. The goal in preventing child abuse and neglect is to stop this violence from happening in the first place.

April is Child Abuse Prevention Month. How can we observe this month and participate in child abuse prevention?

WE CAN:

- Provide support and supplies to families in need at emergency shelters.
- Advocate for changes in culture and communities to reduce the likelihood of child abuse.
- Collect teddy bears to give them to children at a child advocacy center, where children are interviewed after an incident of abuse.


#### **Canine Companions - May I Pet Your Dog?**

There is a huge difference between a Therapy Dog and a Service Dog. A Service Dog is paired with its partner to improve their quality of life. The time need to select and train a Service Dog is lengthy, starting with puppy placement for a fostering education. which provides the basis of human interactions and basic obedience training. The selective training occurs for the particular role that the canine will be providing to their handler. The cost of training a Service Dog varies from \$17,000- \$40,000.

You can recognize a service dog by their special lead, tags and/or jacket. Never approach a Service Dog for petting. This dog is on the job 24/7 with their handler. Be it for Vision Support, Seizure recognition, Blood Sugar recognition, PTSD recognition ... this dog is working!

Therapy Dogs are trained and selected for their even temperament. They are handled by a trained volunteer handler and provide therapeutic intervention in a variety of settings. You may find them in hospitals, schools, reading programs, senior centers, airports, disaster relief centers, and wherever people are stressed or in need of emotional support. To be certified, they must be vet checked, insured and current in their training. The team will be identified by name tag, vest and ID tag. Always ask to pet the dog and approach slowly. Therapy Dogs love to go to work. I often tell people that Therapy Dogs are like politicians. They can work a room without instructions. I have seen my dog enter a room and immediately go to an individual who is stressed.

The current concern of certified dog handlers is the Emotional Support Dogs. There are Service Dogs especially trained to work with PTSD and children with needs for emotional support. But unfortunately, anyone can go online and have their pet "certified" as an "Emotional Support Dog." This has caused numerous problems for the airlines and food service providers when an untrained dog causes havoc in their surroundings. Service Dogs and Therapy Dogs must be able to promptly follow a command when given. They are comfortable around other trained dogs and there are rules that keep them safe. An excellent program for your club would be to invite a Therapy Dog and Service Dog team to discuss their different roles.

Reach out to assisted living, nursing homes, memory care centers, veteran's homes, etc. These facilities have social directors that can assist you in your planning. Consider providing supplies for container gardening including window boxes, pots or baskets and don't forget that herbs make great indoor and outdoor plants.

There are many special events in the month of April regarding the library. Here are a few to give you some ideas of things that your club can do:

Celebrate National Library Week and National Library Workers Day in April by saying #ThankYouLibraries on social media with photos and stories about the library, or organize a special event for library patrons and staff, such as a book reading by an author.

DEAR Day, celebrated on April 12, reminds families to make reading a priority in their lives by setting aside at least 30 minutes that day to enjoy books together.

Celebrate Children's Book Day/Día de los Niños on April 30. Donate books in English and Spanish to local Head Start programs.

#### **LEGISLATION / PUBLIC POLICY**



This article will explain the legislative advocacy process:

GFWC advocates for or against an issue only if a resolution on the issue has been adopted by its members. Resolutions can be found on the GFWC website via the Member Portal. Resolutions are tools members should use to advocate and educate about important issues at the local, state, and national levels. If members feel an issue needs to be addressed by GFWC, any local club can submit a resolution for consideration to the Resolutions Committee. Every resolution currently in effect started with a proposal to the Resolutions Committee.

#### ADVOCACY DO'S AND DON'TS

Some members are under the impression that because GFWC (or their State Federation or local club) holds Internal Revenue Service (IRS) \$501(c)(3) status, its members cannot lobby. IRS guidelines do not ban lobbying activities. Rather, the IRS rules limit the types and amount of lobbying that a 501(c)(3) organization may engage in. Lobbying may not be the primary purpose of the organization, nor may it constitute a substantial part of the organization's activities.

#### DO

- Advocate for action on a specific issue or for a specific piece of legislation.
- Contact your national, state, and local elected officials directly.
- Participate in voter registration drives.
- Hold nonpartisan forums to educate the public about one or more specific issues.
- Sponsor candidate forums, ensuring that all candidates receive a formal invitation to participate.

#### DON'T

- Endorse or oppose a specific candidate or political party.
- Use club funds, facilities, in-kind donations, publications, or events to promote a specific candidate or political party.
- Ask candidates to sign a pledge on any issue.
- Support legislation that conflicts with a GFWC Resolution.

Remember when you push a piece too hard it bends or breaks, so take time to find the right fit for each of them.

There are five things that represent a culture: customs, laws, dress, social standards, and traditions.

The members create a block for a quilt that reflects their background. The blocks are then put together in the form of a quilt. The quilt can be shared with the community. Display it at the local library. Share with a local school class. Display it at the Community Center. Ask members to take it to a meeting of another organization and explain how it came to be, based on the blocks and their meaning.

Extend your learning for the benefit of all, and especially your members.

Your Arts and Culture activities reports should be submitted. I am looking forward to reading all about your clubs' activities.

It was formed as a response to the nationwide rape crisis movement to serve as a support and resource center for women who were victims of crime. In 1982, the name was changed to Victims Resource Center.

Stand Down for Homeless Veterans

Stand downs were started in 1988 by two Vietnam veterans, and named after the military term for a combat unit's time to rest and recover while at war. Today, it is a grassroots effort to offer the same services to homeless veterans.

The philosophy of a stand down is to give homeless veterans a hand up, not a hand out. Stand downs are typically one to three-day events during which homeless and at-risk veterans are provided access to the community resources needed to begin addressing their individual problems and rebuilding their lives.

Resources at an event provide a broad range of necessities including food, clothing, medical screenings, job counseling and referrals, and companionship and camaraderie. Consider volunteering at one of the annual or monthly events sponsored by a local group in your area. Many groups have specific needs and may accept items in addition to, or in place of cash donations.

#### Memorial Day is Monday, May 29

Do not ignore the "Memorial" in **Memorial Day**. We are all beneficiaries of those who have sacrificed their lives for our freedom. We can use this day to actively remember those Americans, including our ancestors, family members, neighbors, friends, and loved ones, who have paid the price for the blessings of liberty. Fly the U.S. flag at half-staff until noon.

Participate in the "National Moment of Remembrance" at 3:00 P.M. local time to pause and think upon the meaning of the day. Pledge to aid widows and orphans of our fallen dead.
